ENGINEERS SELECTED FOR FORMER TANK CAR SITE

At their July 11, 2022 business meeting, the Springfield Township Board of Commissioners awarded a contract to Pennoni Associates to oversee building abatement and demolition activities at the former Tank Car property in Oreland. This award marks the next step in the Township's ongoing effort to remediate the former industrial site for future redevelopment into a public park. Please note that this is only an award for engineering services. Actual abatement and demolition activity is not expected to begin until 2023.

Springfield Township is also excited to announce that it has been awarded a Community Conservation Partnership Program grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources to develop a master site plan for the former tank car site. No time has been set in developing this plan, so please check the township website for more details as they become available.

TOWNSHIP TO DEVELOP A COMMUNITY-WIDE TRAIL PLAN

Safety, connectivity and walkability are the basis for the development of a community-wide trail plan. From enhancing pedestrian safety by providing the public with more off-road opportunities to walk, run, and bike, to making it easier to travel to different parts of the Township without a vehicle, trails are increasingly seen as popular public amenities that the entire community may enjoy.

Members of the public who live or work in Springfield Township are encouraged to voice their opinions on the development of trails in the community. There are several ways individuals can engage and participate in Springfield Township's trail planning process. Township Budget

In 2022, the Springfield Township Board of Commissioners adopted a balanced operating budget of \$18,315,318 with a real estate tax rate of 4.516 mills and an earned income rate of 1.0%. As a result of the 2022 budget, the "typical" residential taxpayer realized no increase in their real estate tax and a decrease of \$6.32 associated with the annual refuse service fee. Public meetings for the 2023 budget are expected to take place in October.

Police & Public Safety

SafeWatch Security Camera Registration Program

Our region has experienced an uptick in thefts from vehicles, including catalytic



converters and have had some success in identifying perpetrators of these crimes by using home camera systems. Several years ago, the Springfield Township Police Department (STPD) instituted the SafeWatch Security Camera Registration Program. Approximately 60 addresses are currently registered with the STPD. Home and business owners are encouraged to voluntarily share video from cameras on their properties to assist police with investigations, and hopefully identify suspect(s) and arrest those responsible.

CATALYTIC CONVERTERS THEFT PREVENTION

Thefts of catalytic converters spiked in 2021, with more than 50,000 converters stolen off of parked vehicles nationwide. Catalytic converters have been federally mandated since 1975, and they are located within the exhaust system to help clean gasoline and diesel emissions. Hybrid vehicles have lower emissions than purely gasoline-powered vehicles, so the metals in their converters tend to last longer.




Converters contain three precious metals: Palladium, Rhodium, and Platinum, which is what makes them highly sought after. According to the Highway Loss Data Institute, the cost to install a new catalytic converter can be as much as \$3,000. We recommend taking the following precautions to prevent catalytic converter theft:

- Call 911 if you see any suspicious activity.
- Park indoors if possible.
- Park in a well lit area.
- Install motion-sensitive lights and cameras in your parking area.
- Consider installing a dash camera.
- Install an anti-theft device.
- Paint your catalytic converter to deter buyers.
- Get your converter etched because thieves have a harder time selling it.

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT 2022

Community-building was on full display as the STPD hosted their annual National Night Out event on August 2, 2022. National Night Out is an annual community-building campaign that promotes police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie to make our neighborhoods safer, more caring places to live.

This year's event featured music, games, fire and Public Works vehicles, free hotdogs and ice cream for kids of all ages, and meet and greets with the fine men and women of the STPD. The Township thanks all who participated and a special thanks to Detective Robert Baiada who served as the principle coordinator for the event.

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

Whenever it rains, stormwater is collected by our local storm sewer system and carried directly to the nearby streams and creeks. It is the Township's responsibility to monitor this system for pollutants. In the case of stormwater, a pollutant is basically anything other than rainwater. Here are a few simple steps that a typical homeowner and/or business owner can do to help reduce pollutants in the rainwater carried to our streams and creeks.



- Use fertilizers very sparingly.
- Sweep up driveways and sidewalks: dispose of debris properly. Do not sweep into street gutters.
- Vegetate bare spots in your yard.
- Compost your yard waste.
- Avoid pesticides.
- Never dump anything down storm drains.
- Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces.
- Avoid washing your car in the driveway.
- Check cars for leaks and recycle motor oil.
- Pick up after your pet, even in your own yard.

By making an effort to keep our rainwater clean you are helping the Township and the environment.

FALL PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CHECKLIST

Fall is a great time of the year to prepare your home and property for the winter months ahead. Below is a list of general home maintenance tasks that will reduce the risk of seasonal damage to your home:

- Clean your gutters and downspouts to ensure that they are free flowing and securely attached. Please be aware that downspouts are not permitted to discharge to an adjoining property.
- Trim all vegetation away from your home, garage/accessory buildings, sidewalk, and any traffic sign installed along your street frontage.
- Check the sidewalks and driveway aprons; replace any damaged blocks to mitigate potential trip hazards.
- Check your windows and doors to ensure that there are no gaps or leaks. Caulking windows and doors will reduce drafts and saves energy.
- Turn off outside water sources and drain your hose to ensure that outdoor water lines do not freeze and burst over the winter months.
- Now is the time to have your heater serviced. Remember to change the filters on a regular basis to improve the operation of your heater and save yourself money over the course of the winter.
- Fall is the ideal time to have your chimney cleaned and serviced. The installation of a chimney cap is a great way to deter unwanted pests.
- Check your attic and make sure all vents are free from obstructions and operating correctly.

Home Heating Safety Tips

Winter is coming and when the temperature drops, many of us find comfort in curling up by the fireplace or heater. Unfortunately, heating devices are a leading cause of home fires and injuries. With the help of these safety tips from the Fire Marshal, you can help prevent heating-related fires from occurring.



- Unplug space heaters when you go to bed or leave the room.
- Never use the oven to heat your home.
- Clear a space of at least three feet from heating equipment.
- Maintain a three-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year.
- Use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning heaters.
- Ensure that your fireplaces has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month.
- Install and maintain carbon monoxide alarms to avoid risk of CO poisoning.

Public Works

Curbside Leaf Waste Collection

The Township's residential curbside leaf collection program runs from late March through December with a special collection week at the end of February – weather permitting.

Leaf waste includes leaves, garden residues, shrubbery and tree trimmings and similar material. Residents should place their leaf waste in a biodegradable paper bag or securely tied and bundled (so as not to exceed 4 feet in length, 6" in diameter, nor 50 pounds in weight) at their curbside by 7:00 AM on their regular collection day. Leaf waste generally gets collected later in the day following refuse and recycling collection.

NOTE: Grass clippings are not leaf waste. Please do not include grass with your leaf waste. Place grass in cans or plastic bags for regular refuse collection.

Fifteen (15) bags of leaf waste will be collected on a weekly basis. To the extent that additional bags are placed at curbside for collection, the Township will make reasonable efforts to remove them in a timely manner.

Please be advised that the Township prohibits the depositing of leaves or materials of any kind in any gutter or upon any street or highway in the Township. **The open burning of leaves or yard waste is also prohibited.**

Tree Collection

Christmas trees are collected during the first three weeks of January. Make sure to remove all decorations and tree stands, and place your tree at the curbside along with your refuse on your normal collection day.

Be sure to not "wrap" your tree in plastic as the trees are chipped into mulch and made available for FREE to the public every spring at our site on W. Wissahickon Avenue (across from St. Joseph Academy).

Trash and recycle will not be collected on the above dates. Trash and leaf waste will be collected the following business day. Recycling will be collected the following week on your regular collection day. Recyclables will be collected on the next business day following the Christmas and New Year's holidays. On these dates only, recycling will be collected the following business day.

HOUSEHOLD RECYCLING REGULATIONS



GLASS: All colors. (NO ceramics, light bulbs, plate glass, head lights, mirrors, windshields or glass blocks).



CANS: Aluminum beverage cans and bi-metal cans.



PLASTICS: (#1 through #7) containers including soft drinks, water bottles, milk jugs, detergent bottles and food/yogurt.



NEWSPAPER, MAGAZINES, JUNK MAIL, PLAIN PAPER, TELEPHONE BOOKS, CORRUGATED CARDBOARD AND PAPERBOARD

Containers including cereal boxes, cracker boxes, and cartons from beer and soda (with no waxy coating) – are recyclable. Please remove contaminants such as trash, pizza boxes, Styrofoam, plastic and all other packing materials.

- 1 Recyclable materials may be combined in one can or container not to exceed 32-gallon capacity or 50 lbs. in weight. Plastic bags are not accepted for recycling purposes.
- 2 New and replacement recycling containers are available at the Township Administration Building (cash or check only).
- 3 Place all acceptable recycling materials **a short distance from refuse materials** on your regular collection day.
- 4 Food containers need to be **cleaned out of any food waste and debris** prior to placement in the recycle can.



Winter is Coming

SNOW STORM OPERATIONS AND REGULATIONS

When winter weather is forecasted, help us keep our community safe with these winter weather tips:



- 1 Remove trash and recycling cans, basketball nets, and the like from the roadway before winter weather arrives to avoid potential damage by snow plows.
- 2 Do not place trash and recycling cans out the night before if snow is forecasted. Check the Township website for possible trash collection updates and cancellations.
- 3 Remember that no vehicle may be parked in the roadway once three (3) inches of snow or more has fallen or a snow emergency is declared. If off-road parking is not available, residents can park on the even side of the street during an even-numbered year or the odd side of the street during an odd-numbered year.
- 4 Clear snow, sleet and ice from sidewalks in front of your property within 24 hours after a storm.
- 5 Do not shovel, blow or plow the snow from your driveway and/or sidewalk into the street.
- 6 Leave space just off the foot of your driveway to avoid being plowed in. Shoveling out a space just before your driveway allows the snow that builds up on the plow to fall off in that space and not in your driveway!
- 7 Keep stormwater inlets open after snow has accumulated. Keeping inlets open will prevent flooding and icing conditions on the street.
- 8 If you have a curbside mailbox, check that your mailbox and post are in good repair and that they are behind the curb, not leaning out over the street.

Please Note: The Township cannot plow residents' private driveways. Please contact a private plow operator if you are in need of assistance in plowing your private driveway.

SNOW SHOVELER REGISTRY

Township ordinances require that snow and ice be removed from your sidewalk no later than 24 hours after the precipitation stops. One of the fundamental purposes of this ordinance is to ensure the safety and welfare of our elderly residents who use public sidewalks as their primary means of transportation. However, many of these same residents are physically unable to comply with the requirements of the ordinances.

At the beginning of the winter season the Township solicits the local Middle and High Schools for students who will, for a fee, shovel snow from walks and driveways. The "business" arrangement is made between the resident and student that he or she chooses to employ.

The full 2022-23 Snow Shoveler list will be available mid-November. Print copies are available at the Township Administration building, or call 215-836-7600.

Moving? Cleaning out the House?



Fall is a great time to clear out the house before the long months of winter. Many residents may choose to move or clean out their house before winter weather begins. Our Public Works Department would like to remind residents that **trash collection is limited to residential, weekly household trash and recycling**. Residents who have excess trash resulting from moving or cleaning out their house, **must contact a dumpster service or private hauler**. Disposal of a piece of furniture can be accommodated, however larger items must be approved by the Township and/or disposed of through a private hauler. Please note: dumpsters are not permitted within the street or public right-of-way.

Help Keep Hydrants Clear



Winter storms often hide fire hydrants under snow and ice, making them difficult to access quickly. If you have a fire hydrant located on or near your property, please consider clearing a 3 foot perimeter around the fire hydrant in order to allow firefighters access to the fire hydrant in an emergency situation.

In Other News

Charge Up your Electric Vehicle

Did you know that electric vehicle (EV) owners can charge up while visiting the Springfield Township Municipal Campus? New directional signage on Paper Mill Road helps point EV drivers to the two EV chargers located on the far side of the Library's parking lot. Stop by to check it out and/or charge up for only \$0.12/kwh.



Tree Tenders

Planting trees can be a great way to enhance the health and well-being of the community. To help improve the overall tree canopy, Springfield Township is pleased to announce the formation of a new Tree Tenders group. The Springfield Tree Tenders is an independent volunteer group committed to work to organize future tree plantings, tree maintenance, and the encouragement of mindful planting practices throughout the Township. The Tree Tender group has been certified by the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society and each member has been deemed a registered Tree Tender. This is a community/volunteer based group dedicated to bettering the Township one tree at a time. Residents who are interested in getting involved can visit the PHS website, phsonline.org.

GOING GREEN TO STABILIZE STREAMBANKS

Mermaid Park in Wyndmoor was the site of a streambank stabilization project this summer thanks to funding received from a Montco 2040 Implementation Grant. Approximately 160 linear feet of streambank at the entrance of the park was stabilized using a green, living wall product that will eventually grow to become a natural anchor as root systems lock the soil into place and prevent further erosion from stormwater runoff. This project is part of a larger investment initiative at Mermaid Park that will conclude with the construction of a trail around the perimeter of the park.



TOWNSHIP PROJECTS

Springfield Township continuously invests its resources into projects that improve the infrastructure, safety, accessibility, functionality, and beauty of our community on a routine basis.
